## **Implementing Safer Speed Limits**

Increased funding to <u>fix the most dangerous streets</u> in Seattle, and implement the safer speed limits resolution. This allocation includes \$2 million for Vision Zero corridors (larger projects such as Rainier Ave S or 65<sup>th</sup> Ave NE) and \$1 million for Vision Zero Spot Improvements (smaller projects identified by neighborhoods and data, including traffic calming and crosswalks). *\$3 million (CIP Project ID: TC367520)* 




## **Sidewalk Funding Summit & Condition Assessment**

At the current rate of funding, it will take 300 years to complete Seattle's sidewalk network. The city, through its DON outreach staff, should engage communities in a frank discussion of potential sidewalk funding options.

In addition, SDOT does not know the condition of Seattle's \$5.3 billion sidewalks that exist today, or know when significant portions will require repair. A condition assessment will ensure smart investments in repairs. \$400,000 (BCL: Sidewalk Maintenance) + staff allocation (DON SDOT staff)

#### **Equitable Safe Routes to School Outreach**

Safe Routes to School staff (2 FTEs) to <u>engage our lowest income</u> <u>neighborhood schools</u> in what safety improvements their communities need most. \$300,000 (CIP Project ID: TC367170)





#### Prepare Accessible Mt Baker for Big Federal Grants

Move Accessible Mt. Baker project to 30% design so SDOT can be prepared to <u>strongly compete for federal grants</u>. SDOT will apply for a Small Starts grant in 2017 for bus routes using this corridor, and a TIGER grant in 2018. *\$1 million (CIP Project ID: TC367770)* 



## North Beacon Hill Town Center Transportation Plan

The North Beacon Hill Urban Village and light rail station area have significant mobility and safety needs that have been identified by the community and by SDOT. All agree the next step is a multimodal transportation plan. This plan would integrate the neighborhood's vision with SDOT's projects, and allow much needed safety projects to move forward. The plan will help leverage contributions from the significant private development that is coming. \$150,000 (BCL Neighborhood Enhancements Program)

#### Complete the Central Area Neighborhood Greenway

The Central Area Neighborhood Greenway is a 5.5 mile safe route for people walking and biking that connects the Mt Baker, Central District, Captiol Hill, and Montlake neighborhoods. Unfortunately, it is <u>broken in two by an inaccessible dirt path</u>. Parks and SDOT have created a design that will create a pedestrian staircase and wheel friendly path. *\$1 million (CIP Project ID: TC366760)*
